Dear Applicant:

This letter affirms our letter of August 29, 1980, recognizing you as exempt from federal income tax under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization described in section 501(c)(3) and in the section(s) 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(i).

If your sources of support, or your purposes, character, or method of operation change, please let your key district know so that office can consider the effect of the change on your exempt status and foundation status. In the case of an amended document or bylaws, please send a copy of the amended document or bylaws to your key district. Also, you should inform your key District Director of all changes in your name or address.

As of January 1, 1984, you are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration of \$100 or more you pay to each of your employees during a calendar year. This does not apply, however, if you make or have made a timely election under section 3121(w) of the Code to be exempt from such tax. You are not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

Since you are not a private foundation, you are not subject to the excise taxes under Chapter 42 of the Code. However, you are not automatically exempt from other federal excise taxes. If you have any questions about excise, employment, or other federal taxes, please contact your key District Director.

Donors may deduct contributions to you as provided in section 170 of the Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to you or for your use are deductible for federal estate

and gift tax purposes if they meet the applicable provisions of sections 2055, 2106, and 2522.

Donors (including private foundations) may rely on this ruling unless the Internal Revenue Service publishes notice to the contrary. However, if you lose your 509(a) status as shown above, donors (other than private foundations) may not rely on the classification shown above if they were in part responsible for, or were aware of, the act that resulted in your loss of such status, or they acquired knowledge that the Internal Revenue Service had given notice that you would be removed from that classification. Private foundations may rely on the classification as long as you were not directly or indirectly controlled by them or by disqualified persons with respect to them. However, private foundations may not rely on the classification shown above if they acquired knowledge that the Internal Revenue Service had given notice that you would be removed from that classification.

If your organization conducts fund raising events such as benefit dinners, auctions, membership drives, etc., where something of value is received in return for contributions, you can help your donors avoid difficulties with their income tax returns by assisting them in determining the proper tax treatment of their contributions. To do this you should, in advance of the event, determine the fair market value of the benefit received and state it in your fund raising materials such as solicitations, tickets, and receipts in such a way that your donors can determine how much is deductible and how much is not. To assist you in this, the Service has issued Publication 1391, Deductibility of Payments Made to Organizations Conducting Fund Raising Events. You may obtain copies of Publication 1391 from your key district office.

You are not required to file federal income tax returns unless you are subject to the tax on unrelated business income under section 511 of the Code. If you are subject to this tax, you must file an income tax return on Form 990-T, Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return. In this letter we are not determining whether any of your present or proposed activities are unrelated trade or business as defined in section 513 of the Code.

You are required to make a copy of your exemption application, and supporting documents, and this exemption letter available for public inspection. Failure to make these documents available for public inspection may subject you to a penalty of \$10 per day for each day there is failure to comply. See Inter-

nal Revenue Service Notice 88-120, 1988-2 C.B. 454, for additional information.

To assure your continued exemption, you should maintain records to show that funds are expended only for those purposes. If you distribute funds to other organizations, your records should show whether they are exempt under section 501(c)(3). In cases where the recipient organization is not exempt under section 501(c)(3), there should be evidence that the funds will remain dedicated to the required purposes and that they will be used for those purposes by the recipient.

If distributions are made to individuals, case histories regarding the recipients should be kept showing names, addresses, purposes of avards, manner of selection, and relationship (if any) to members, officers, trustees or donors of funds to you, so that any and all distributions made to individuals can be substantiated upon request by the Internal Revenue Service. (Rev. Rul. 56-304 1956-2, C.B. 306.)

In this letter, we have not determined the effect on your tax-exempt status of financing your activities with the proceeds of tax-exempt bonds since you have not indicated that you intend to use such methods now or in the future.

Please use your EIN number on all returns you file and in all correspondence with the Internal Revenue Service. Because this letter could help resolve any questions about your exempt status and foundation status, you should keep it in your permanent records.

Church of Scientology Western United States ("CSWUS") originally applied for recognition of its tax exempt status under section 501(c)(3) in 1980 under the name Church of Scientology of San Diego and received a favorable determination letter dated August 26, 1980. (A copy of the determination letter is attached hereto as Exhibit E.) Such determination continues in effect. The name of the corporation was changed by an amendment to the articles of incorporation filed with the Office of the Secretary of State of the State of California on May 21, 1985. (Exhibit C.) CSWUS is filing the instant application for exemption concurrently with applications being filed for a number of churches of Scientology and related organizations at the request of, and pursuant to an understanding with the National Office of the Internal Revenue Service, for the purpose of updating CSWUS's exemption record.

#### Part II, Question 1 - Description of Activities

Church of Scientology of San Diego was incorporated on April 13, 1971 as a California nonprofit religious corporation for the purpose of practicing and propagating the Scientology religion. By amendment to the articles of incorporation filed on May 21, 1985, the name of the corporation was changed to Church of Scientology Western United States ("CSWUS"). Copies of the Articles of Incorporation, Restated Articles of Incorporation, the Amendment changing the corporate name and the Bylaws are attached hereto as Exhibits A, B, C and D, respectively.

CSWUS is a church within the Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy. As stated in Article Three of its Restated Articles of Incorporation, CSWUS's purpose is to:

. . . espouse, present, propagate, practice, ensure, and maintain the purity and integrity of the religion of Scientology, as the same has been developed and may be further developed by L. Ron Hubbard to the end that any person wishing to, and participating in Scientology may derive the greatest possible good of the spiritual awareness of his Beingness, Doingness and Knowingness.

#### (Exhibit B.)

CSWUS's activities are described fully below. Detailed information concerning the organizational structure, religious activities and financial affairs of the Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy and related organizations is contained in the administrative record of the exemption determination proceeding for Church of Scientology International ("CSI"), the Mother Church of the Scientology religion.

#### The Scientology Religion

Scientology is a religion based upon the research, writings and recorded lectures of its founder, L. Ron Hubbard, which collectively constitute the Scripture of the religion. The Scientology Scriptures are the sole source of all the doctrines, tenets, sacraments, rituals and policies of the Scientology faith. They encompass more than 500,000 pages of writings, nearly 3,000 taped lectures and over 100 films.

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#### Part II, Question 1 - Description of Activities

The basic tenet of the Scientology religion is that man is an immortal spirit who is basically good and ethical who has lived through countless previous lifetimes and who will live again and again. Although he has a mind and a body, he is himself a spiritual being. The ultimate goal of Scientology is "a civilization without insanity, without criminals and without war, where the able can prosper and honest beings can have rights, and where Man is free to rise to greater heights."

The principal religious practices in Scientology are "auditing" and "training," which consist of a gradient scale of religious services addressing the spirit. The purpose of auditing is to unburden man of past painful experiences and to orient him as a spiritual being. Auditing results in an increase in spiritual awareness and ability. Ultimately the person achieves certainty of himself as a spirit and freedom from unwanted burdens. At this point he also is certain of immortality. "Training" also increases spiritual awareness and ability for the individual and enables a person to utilize the religious technologies of Scientology to improve conditions with him or herself and others.

Scientology is an exact faith, and a fundamental doctrine of the religion is that its religious services must be orthodox. It holds that spiritual salvation can be attained if, and only if, the path to salvation outlined in the Scripture's religious technology is followed without deviation.

#### The Scientology Religious Hierarchy

Churches of Scientology that minister religious services to the public are arranged in a hierarchy that reflects the gradient nature of the spiritual levels of Scientology.

At the base of the religious hierarchy of Scientology are independent ministers and missions of Scientology which minister auditing to the spiritual level of Clear and lower-level and introductory training services. Class V churches of Scientology also minister all auditing levels that are ministered by missions, plus the Clear Certainty Rundown, which verifies whether or not the state of Clear has been achieved. Class V churches also train and ordain ministers and provide religious training to the level of Class V auditor. Saint Hill churches minister all of the levels of

the churches below them as well as religious training to the level of Class VII auditor. Advanced Organizations minister the auditing levels of the churches below them as well as the confidential advanced auditing levels up to the spiritual level of New OT V, and religious training to the level of Class VIII auditor. The Church of Scientology Flag Service Organization ministers auditing to the spiritual level of New OT VII and the highest levels of religious training, Class XII auditor. The highest level of auditing, New OT VIII, is ministered only by the Foundation Church of Scientology Flag Ship Service Org aboard the M.V. Freewinds.

#### The Church's Activities

The CSWUS corporation houses six distinct ecclesiastical organizations that includes three churches, each of which ministers religious services at a different level of the religious hierarchy described above; two supervisory organizations and an ecclesiastical support organization. Each of these organizations is discussed separately below. Except for the Church of Scientology of San Diego, all of these church organizations are located in Los Angeles where they share a large complex of buildings and facilities.

## 1. Church of Scientology Advanced Organization of Los Angeles ("AOLA")

AOLA is one of four advanced organizations in the world and the only one located in the United States. As an advanced organization AOLA is authorized to minister the Scientology advanced technology to the level of New OT V and religious training to the level of Class VIII auditor as well as most of the lower levels of auditing and religious training. As one of only two churches authorized to minister the advanced technology in the United States (Church of Scientology Flag Service Organization as a higher level church can also minister the advanced levels), AOLA's parishioners include Scientologists from all over the United States, Canada and Mexico.

AOLA's activities consist of the ministry of religious services and administrative and executive functions necessary to support this ministry. AOLA's staff includes auditors, case supervisors, course supervisors and other staff directly involved in ministering services, as well as executive and administrative

staff that perform necessary support functions such as personnel, communications, ethics, treasury and finances, administration and dissemination. The highest ecclesiastical position in AOLA is its Captain, who, together with her deputies and other top executives form its executive council, the highest ecclesiastical body in the organization. Beneath the executive council is an advisory council, comprised of the heads of AOLA's divisions. These two bodies, subject to ecclesiastical management advice and direction from senior ecclesiastical organizations (which are described below), direct AOLA's day-to-day and week-to-week activities.

#### 2. American Saint Hill Organization ("ASHO")

ASHO is one of only four Saint Hill Organizations in the world (each situated at the same location as the four Advanced Organizations), and the only Saint Hill Organization in the United States.

Saint Hill Organizations are so named because they specialize in delivering the Saint Hill Special Briefing Course ("Briefing Course") and other Scientology religious services at a comparable level. The Briefing Course is a very extensive, advanced course in auditor training which includes a chronological study of the written and recorded Scientology Scriptures. ASHO also ministers other religious training and lower-level and intermediate level auditing. The religious services ministered by ASHO generally emphasize training.

There are actually two separate ASHO organizations, ASHO Day and ASHO Foundation. These organizations share the same premises and facilities, but operate on different schedules. ASHO Day operates on weekdays and ASHO Foundation operates during the evenings and on the weekends.

Each of ASHO Day and ASHO Foundation has a Captain, an executive council and an advisory council that directs the daily and weekly activities of the two organizations. Their activities consist of the ministry of religious services and the executive, administrative and support functions which make that possible.

#### Church of Scientology of San Diego

Church of Scientology of San Diego is a Class V church of Scientology and is authorized to minister Scientology auditing to the State of Clear and auditor training to the level of Class V auditor. It is a local church of Scientology for the San Diego area.

#### Continental Liaison Office West U.S. ("CLO WUS")

CLO WUS is an intermediate level ecclesiastical management organization which acts as a liaison for CSI. (CSI's ecclesiastical authority and relationship with CSWUS is described more fully later in response to this Question and in the response to Part II, Question 5.) CLO WUS administers Church programs and provides guidance and advice to Scientology churches in the Western United States. There are 30 separate churches under CLO WUS's ecclesiastical jurisdiction, including 27 Class V churches (including the San Diego church), AOLA, ASHO Day and ASHO Foundation. CLO WUS reviews operations of the Scientology churches within its ecclesiastical jurisdiction and liaises with CLO WUS also sends experienced staff to Scientology churches in the Western United States to assist them in attaining orthodoxy in religious practice and administration. CLO WUS also provides auditing and religious training to its own staff and to staff of other churches in the United States.

#### Commodore's Messenger Organization Pacific ("CMO PAC")

CMO PAC oversees the execution of programs from the Commodore's Messenger Organization International of CSI and acts as a liaison between CSWUS and CSI with respect to those programs.

#### Pacific Base Crew ("PBC")

PBC is the organization responsible for maintaining the complex of Scientology buildings and other facilities used by CSWUS and other Scientology organizations in Los Angeles. PBC is responsible for renovations, some construction and most repairs to these facilities. Its staff also provides meals and berthing to the staff of all Scientology organizations located in the Scientology complex.

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#### Part II, Question 1 - Description of Activities

#### The Scientology Religious Marks and Advanced Technology

The churches and other organizations that comprise Scientology's ecclesiastical hierarchy recognize CSI as the authority on ecclesiastical matters by virtue of its status as the Mother Church. (See the CSWUS's Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation, Exhibit B.)

CSI's ecclesiastical authority is further enhanced by a written covenant between it and Religious Technology Center with respect to the use of the Scientology religious marks by churches and other organizations within the ecclesiastical hierarchy. (Religious Technology Center is the owner of the religious marks associated with the Scientology religion.) Through the covenant, Religious Technology Center has given CSI the right and responsibility to permit the organizations of the religion of Scientology to use the marks. Without CSI's written authority to use the marks, and Religious Technology Center's approval, an organization cannot legally use the marks and thus cannot call itself a Scientology organization.

Pursuant to its authority, CSI granted CSWUS the right to puse the Scientology religious marks by a written covenant. CSWUS is not required to pay royalties for use of the marks. (Exhibit F.)

Religious Technology Center also owns the confidential advanced technology of the Scientology religion. Religious Technology Center has authorized CSWUS to use the advanced technology at AOLA by written covenant. (Exhibit J.) CSWUS provides RTC six percent of the value of religious services it ministers with respect to the advanced technology.

CSWUS has entered into an ecclesiastical management agreement with CSI pursuant to which CSI provides CSWUS with ecclesiastical advice, programs and guidance, staff training and general coordination of activities with other Scientology organizations. (A copy of the agreement is attached as Exhibit G.) In exchange for these services CSWUS supports CSI's program of activities by making ecclesiastical management payments in accordance with its means, generally 12.5 percent of the contributions it receives, to be offset against CSI's subsequent billings.

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#### Part II, Question 1 - Description of Activities

CSWUS also has entered into agreements with CSI with respect to the orthodox exhibition of films relating to the practice of the Scientology faith (Exhibit H) and the care of confidential information parishioners disclose to it in the ministration of religious services (Exhibit I). In exchange for use of the films, CSWUS provides CSI nine percent of the contributions it receives from parishioners who participate in training services.

#### The Church's Staff Personnel

All of the ecclesiastical organizations within CSWUS, with the exception of the Church of Scientology of San Diego, are "Sea Org" organizations, which means its staff members belong to the Scientology religious order, the Sea Organization (or the "Sea Org"). To become members of the Sea Org, CSWUS's staff members must pledge the next billion years of their existence to the Scientology religion. As Sea Org members, CSWUS's staff live and work in a manner befitting their fundamental and total commitment to the Scientology faith.

They live communally in church-provided berthing and eat communally in a church-provided dining room. They are required to live on church premises so they can live free of the distractions of the secular world and be ready to attend to their religious duties at any time during the day or night. As a general matter, each of CSWUS's Sea Org staff members devotes 14 hours a day to his or her ecclesiastical duties and religious study.

CSWUS's Sea Org staff personnel are compensated for their ecclesiastical service with a nominal allowance (currently \$50.00 a week) and small bonuses for good performance of their assigned duties, room and board, medical and dental expenses (as needed) and child care or school tuition for children. Under certain circumstances staff registrars also may receive a very small commission (1/8 to 1/4 percent) of funds they raise. Staff also may receive commissions from sales of Scientology religious books of 15 percent of the sales price. They are required to wear the official uniforms of the Sea Org, which CSWUS provides.

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#### Part II, Question 3 - Fundraising Program

CSWUS, particularly AOLA, ASHO and the San Diego Church, disseminate the religion through various means to attract new parishioners and encourage their existing parishioners to continue their spiritual advancement through Scientology auditing and religious training. These organizations mail dissemination materials directly to their parishioners and distribute them on Church premises and at Church gatherings. Their staff also write personal letters to parishioners to encourage their participation. Two very important dissemination materials are the official magazines AOLA and ASHO publish, Advance and The Auditor, respectively. (Representative examples of these magazines and other dissemination materials are attached as Exhibit K, L, and M.

AOLA, ASHO and the San Diego church also conduct their own programs whereby individual Church parishioners who do not serve on staff proselytize and disseminate the religion to the general public and encourage their fellow parishioners to continue their spiritual advancement. These Scientologists, called "Field Staff Members," play an integral role in the dissemination and proselytization of the religion. Since the successful efforts of Field Staff Members results in contributions to CSWUS as well as the spiritual advancement of its parishioners, CSWUS pays Field Staff Members a fundraising commission when the Scientologist they have been working with begins services at CSWUS.

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#### Part II, Question 4, Officers, Directors and Trustees

The officers, directors and trustees of CSWUS are not compensated for such positions. Other than trustee Gary Van Dyke who is staff member of CSI, all of the officers, directors and trustees of CSWUS also hold staff positions in CSWUS and are compensated by CSWUS for their services as staff members. These amounts are reflected in the response to Part IV at Line 17.

#### Part II, Question 5 - Relationship With Other Organizations

CSWUS's relationship with CSI and Religious Technology Center with respect to ecclesiastical governance and covenants respecting use of the religious marks and the ministry of the Scientology advanced technology are described in the response to Part II, Question 1.

United States Parishioners Trust ("USPT") is a United States trust that holds unused advance contributions for religious services by parishioners of two U.S. churches, CSWUS and Church of Scientology Flag Service Organization, subject to the parishioners' instructions. USPT will dissolve at the end of 1993 and its assets will be distributed to appropriate tax exempt organizations recognized under Section 501(c)(3) in accordance; with the dissolution clause of its trust instrument.

Building Management Services ("BMS") is a California nonprofit corporation that holds title to buildings used by churches of Scientology and related organizations. CSWUS leases its facilities at the Scientology complex in Los Angeles and other buildings used for staff berthing from BMS. (See response to Part II, Question 9.)

CSWUS's relationship with CSI, RTC, USPT, BMS and other churches of Scientology and their related organizations is described in more detail in CSI's administrative record.

CSWUS's director and President, Karin Hvass, is also a trustee of Church of Scientology Religious Trust.

#### Part II, Question 7, Financial Accountability

While CSWUS is responsible for and manages its own finances, it recognizes the ecclesiastical authority of CSI with respect to financial matters that affect the religion.

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#### Part II, Question 7, Financial Accountability

Consequently, CSWUS presents proposals to CSI's reserves committee for its approval for expenditure from its reserve accounts. CSWUS also provides CSI weekly reports as to its financial affairs as well as its other activities. A representative copy of such financial reports is included in CSI's administrative record.

#### Part II, Question 9b, Leases

CSWUS leases its church facilities in Los Angeles from Building Management Services. CSWUS's relationship with Building Management Services is discussed in the response to Part II, Question 5. The building that houses Church of Scientology of San Diego is leased by CSWUS from SCEFS Associates. The only relationship CSWUS has with this entity is as lessor/lessee.

Copies of CSWUS's leases are attached as Exhibit N.

#### Part II, Questions 11a, Determination of Charges

The amounts of contributions required for CSWUS's religious services and the religious books and materials that CSWUS sells are established by the Mother Church, CSI.

CSI's policy for setting contribution rates include the following criteria: all amounts are set to enable churches of Scientology to provide the services, Scriptures and other materials of the religion to more and more members of the general public so that everyone eventually can achieve spiritual salvation. CSI accomplishes this policy by requiring all pricing proposals to undergo extensive review by the executives of the ecclesiastical hierarchy who are involved in the production, dissemination or delivery of the publication, service or material involved. This extensive review is ecclesiastically mandated to ensure each proposal meets the following three criteria.

First, the fixed donation amount must be affordable to a broad segment of the general public. Second, the amount must enable the Church to recover the costs of production or delivery of the materials. Third, the donation amount must be sufficient to enable the Church to remain operational so it can continue performing its religious functions, replenish stocks if necessary, and expand so it can provide for or minister to an ever growing congregation.

While CSI employed different methods to implement this policy over the years, the basic principles and review procedures have remained unchanged.
