### Dear Applicant:

Based on information supplied, and assuming your operations will be as stated in your application for recognition of exemption, we have determined you are exempt from federal income tax under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization described in section 501(c)(3).

We have further determined that you are not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code, because you are an organization described in the section(s) above.

If your sources of support, or your purposes, character, or method of operation change, please let your key district know so that office can consider the effect of the change on your exempt status and foundation status. In the case of an amended document or bylaws, please send a copy of the amended document or bylaws to your key district. Also, you should inform your key District Director of all changes in your name or address.

As of January 1, 1984, you are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuncration of \$100 or more you pay to each of your employees during a calendar year. This does not apply, however, if you make or have made a timely election under section 3121(w) of the Code to be exempt from such tax. You are not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

Since you are not a private foundation, you are not subject to the excise taxes under Chapter 42 of the Code. However, you are not automatically exempt from other federal excise taxes. If you have any questions about excise, employment, or other federal taxes, please contact your key District Director.

Contributions to you are not deductible in computing United States income tax. Under section 170(c)(2)(A) of the Code charitable contributions by donors to organizations formed either outside the United States or under foreign law are not deductible.

Bequests, legacies, devises, or transfers to or for your use are deductible in computing the taxable estate of a deceased resident or citizen of the United States for United States estate tax purposes in the manner and to the extent provided by sections 2055 and 2106 of the Code. Gifts of property to or for your use are deductible in computing the United States gift tax of a resident or citizen of the United States in the manner and to the extent provided for by section 2522.

Donors (including private foundations) may rely on this ruling unless the Internal Revenue Service publishes notice to the contrary. However, if you lose your 509(a) status as shown above, donors (other than private foundations) may not rely on the classification shown above if they were in part responsible for, or were aware of, the act that resulted in your loss of such status, or they acquired knowledge that the Internal Revenue Service had given notice that you would be removed from that classification. Private foundations may rely on the classification as long as you were not directly or indirectly controlled by them or by disqualified persons with respect to them. However, private foundations may not rely on the classification shown above if they acquired knowledge that the Internal Revenue Service had given notice that you would be removed from that classification.

If your organization conducts fund raising events such as benefit dinners, auctions, membership drives, etc., where something of value is received in return for contributions, you can help your donors avoid difficulties with their income tax returns by assisting them in determining the proper tax treatment of their contributions. To do this you should, in advance of the event, determine the fair market value of the benefit received and state it in your fund raising materials such as solicitations, tickets, and receipts in such a way that your donors can determine how much is deductible and how much is not. To assist you in this, the Service has issued Publication 1391, Deductibility of Payments Made to Organizations Conducting Fund Raising

Events. You may obtain copies of Publication 1391 from your key district office.

Unless you are subject to the tax imposed by section 511 of the Code and are required to file Form 990-T, Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return, you are not required to file United States income tax returns for income you receive from sources within the United States. You can determine whether income is derived from sources within the United States by referring to Subchapter N of the Code. In this letter we are not determining whether any of your present or proposed activities are unrelated trade or business as defined in section 513.

You are required to make a copy of your exemption application, and supporting documents, and this exemption letter available for public inspection. Failure to make these documents available for public inspection may subject you to a penalty of \$10 per day for each day there is failure to comply. See Internal Revenue Service Notice 88-120, 1988-2 C.B. 454, for additional information.

This ruling is based on evidence that your funds are dedicated to the purposes listed in section 501(c)(3) of the Code. To assure your continued exemption, you should maintain records to show that funds are expended only for those purposes. If you distribute funds to other organizations, your records should show whether they are exempt under section 501(c)(3). In cases where the recipient organization is not exempt under section 501(c)(3), there should be evidence that the funds will remain dedicated to the required purposes and that they will be used for those purposes by the recipient.

If distributions are made to individuals, case histories regarding the recipients should be kept showing names, addresses, purposes of awards, manner of selection, and relationship (if any) to members, officers, trustees or donors of funds to you, so that any and all distributions made to individuals can be substantiated upon request by the Internal Revenue Service. (Rev. Rul. 56-304 1956-2, C.B. 306.)

In this letter, we have not determined the effect on your tax-exempt status of financing your activities with the proceeds of tax-exempt bonds since you have not indicated that you intend to use such methods now or in the future.

You need an employer identification number even if you have no employees. Please use that number on all returns you file and in all correspondence with the Internal Revenue Service. We are informing your key District Director of this ruling. Because

this letter could help resolve any questions about your exempt status and foundation status, you should keep it in your permanent records.

Foundation Church of Scientology Flag Ship Service Organization ("FSSO") is organized as a Netherlands Antilles religious foundation. Its organizing documents are the same in most respects to the articles of incorporation under which other churches of Scientology are organized in the United States. Copies of its organizing instrument and bylaws are attached hereto as Exhibits A and B, respectively.

As discussed in the response to Part II, Question 1, FSSO currently is undergoing a reorganization to undertake activities that up to now have been conducted by two other Scientology organizations. FSSO's organizing instrument has been amended to reflect these changes. A copy of the amended organizing instrument is attached as Exhibit C.

Foundation Church of Scientology Flag Ship Service Organization ("FSSO") was established as a Netherlands Antilles religious foundation on April 21, 1988 (see response to Part I, Question 10), for the purpose of ministering the highest level of Scientology religious services in a religious sanctuary aboard the M.V. Freewinds. Because it ministers Scientology religious services that are available nowhere else in the world FSSO fulfills a unique role in the international Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy.

FSSO's specific activities are described fully below. Detailed information concerning the organizational structure, religious activities and financial affairs of the Scientology ecclesiastical hierarchy and related organizations is contained in the administrative record of the exemption determination proceeding for Church of Scientology International ("CSI"), the Mother Church of the Scientology religion.

#### The Scientology Religion

Scientology is a religion based upon the research, writings and recorded lectures of its founder, L. Ron Hubbard, which collectively constitute the Scripture of the religion. The Scientology Scriptures are the sole source of all the doctrines, tenets, sacraments, rituals and policies of the Scientology faith. They encompass more than 500,000 pages of writings, nearly 3,000 taped lectures and over 100 films.

The basic tenet of the Scientology religion is that man is an immortal spirit who is basically good and ethical who has lived through countless previous lifetimes and who will live again and again. Although he has a mind and a body, he is himself a spiritual being. The ultimate goal of Scientology is "a civilization without insanity, without criminals and without war, where the able can prosper and honest beings can have rights, and where Man is free to rise to greater heights."

The principal religious practices in Scientology are "auditing" and "training," which consist of a gradient scale of religious services addressing the spirit. The purpose of auditing is to unburden man of past painful experiences and to orient him as a spiritual being. Auditing results in an increase in spiritual awareness and ability. Ultimately the person

achieves certainty of himself as a spirit and freedom from unwanted burdens. At this point he also is certain of immortality. "Training" also increases spiritual awareness and ability for the individual and enables a person to utilize the religious technologies of Scientology to improve conditions with him or herself and others.

Scientology is an exact faith, and a fundamental doctrine of the religion is that its religious services must be orthodox. It holds that spiritual salvation can be attained if, and only if, the path to salvation outlined in the Scripture's religious technology is followed without deviation.

## The Scientology Religious Hierarchy

Churches of Scientology that minister religious services to the public are arranged in a hierarchy that reflects the gradient nature of the spiritual levels of Scientology.

At the base of the religious hierarchy of Scientology are independent ministers and missions of Scientology which minister auditing to the spiritual level of Clear and lower-level and introductory training services. Class V churches of Scientology also minister all auditing levels that are ministered by missions, plus the Clear Certainty Rundown, which verifies whether or not the state of Clear has been achieved. Class V churches also train and ordain ministers and provide religious training to the level of Class V auditor. Saint Hill churches minister all of the levels of the churches below them as well as religious training to the level of Class VII auditor. Advanced Organizations minister the auditing levels of the churches below them as well as the confidential advanced auditing levels up to the spiritual level of New OT V, and religious training to the level of Class VIII auditor. The Church of Scientology Flag Service Organization ministers auditing to the spiritual level of New OT VII and the highest levels of religious training, Class XII auditor. The highest level of auditing, New OT VIII, is ministered only by FSSO aboard the M.V. Freewinds.

#### The Church's Activities

The Church is a church of the Scientology religion and operates in most respects like other churches of Scientology - its primary activity being to minister Scientology auditing and religious training to its parishioners. However, FSSO is unique in that it ministers religious services available nowhere else in the world and conducts its ministry aboard the M.V. Freewinds, a 7056 ton, 440 foot ship based in the Caribbean.

FSSO's activities all revolve around the ministration of auditing and training to Scientologists who come to the <u>Freewinds</u> from around the world. FSSO has a specially trained team of highly trained Case Supervisors, auditors and supporting staff in order to minister New OT VIII to qualifying parishioners who have progressed to that level. FSSO also ministers other special Scientology courses unavailable anywhere else as well as certain lower levels of auditing and training to parishioners who wish to receive them while on board.

FSSO conducts its ministry aboard the <u>Freewinds</u> in order to provide a safe, distraction-free environment for the ministry of the highest and most confidential Scientology auditing level. The ship also has an historical and religious significance to Scientologists as it recreates the environment at sea of the Sea Organization in the 1960s and 1970s when Mr. Hubbard was researching the advanced levels aboard the ship <u>Apollo</u> in the Mediterranean. FSSO ministers its religious services in facilities aboard the <u>Freewinds</u> that have been designed for this purpose, including private auditing rooms conducive to the one-to-one nature of auditing, as well as large course rooms where many students can congregate to train together.

As a general matter, Scientologists who visit the Freewinds do so for purely religious objectives rather than for recreation, and consequently the <u>Freewinds</u> is not operated like an ordinary cruise ship. It has very limited recreational facilities — only one small pool, used four or five hours sporadically throughout the day; one volleyball court, used one hour a day, if that; one basketball hoop, which might be used a half hour each day; and no shuffleboard or tennis courts. FSSO encourages its passengers to visit ports at which it may stop for short periods (generally three hours) in order to maintain good relations with the local

communities. Gambling is not permitted, and alcohol is not served to either passengers or crew. Only qualified Scientologists in good standing with CSI are eligible for passage.

The fact that the Scientologists who visit the Freewinds do so for exclusively religious purposes is reflected by the time they spend on their religious services while on board. For the most part, Freewinds passengers fall into two major categories -those who come to receive religious services in OT Hatting which require a one-week stay, and those who come to receive religious services like Key To Life and New OT VIII, which require a much longer stay (from three, to four to six weeks). Scientologists in the first category generally participate in religious services approximately five to seven hours a day, seven days a week; Scientologists in the second category generally participate in religious services eight to ten hours a day, seven days a week. A third category of passengers consists of Scientologists who visit the Freewinds for a limited time in order to attend a specific religious event or conference. FSSO estimates that on average only five percent of passengers do not receive regularlyscheduled religious services. These Scientologists come to the Freewinds simply to participate in a pure Scientology religious environment and to spend time talking to other Scientologists about their own religious experiences.

In addition to the FSSO staff directly involved in ministering religious services to parishioners of the Church, FSSO also has executive and administrative staff who conduct all other necessary activities of the organization, including for example, personnel matters, communications, treasury and finances, administration and dissemination. These activities are directed by the Commanding Officer FSSO, who, together with his deputies and other top executives form FSSO's executive council, the highest ecclesiastical body in the organization. Beneath the executive council is FSSO's advisory council, comprised of the heads of each of FSSO's divisions. These two bodies direct the day-to-day and week-to-week activities of FSSO.

Up to now the actual operation of the <u>Freewinds</u> and provision of berthing and meals to passengers has been conducted by a separate corporation, Majestic Cruise Lines ("MCL"). Currently a reorganization is underway by which FSSO will

undertake directly activities now being conducted by MCL as well as certain communication support activities currently being conducted by another corporation, Church of Scientology Freewinds Relay Office. The current activities of these corporations and the reorganization are described in response to Part II, Question 5.

## The Scientology Religious Marks and Advanced Technology

The churches and other organizations that comprise Scientology's ecclesiastical hierarchy recognize CSI as the authority on ecclesiastical matters by virtue of its status as the Mother Church. (See the FSSO's Bylaws, Article II-e, Exhibit B.)

CSI's ecclesiastical authority is further enhanced by a written covenant between it and Religious Technology Center with respect to the use of the Scientology religious marks by churches and other organizations within the ecclesiastical hierarchy. Religious Technology Center is the owner of the religious marks associated with the Scientology religion. Through the covenant, Religious Technology Center has given CSI the right and responsibility to permit the organizations of the religion of Scientology to use the marks. Without CSI's written authority to use the marks, and Religious Technology Center's approval, an organization cannot legally use the marks and thus cannot call itself a Scientology organization.

Pursuant to its authority, CSI granted the FSSO the right to use the Scientology religious marks by a written covenant. (Exhibit D.) FSSO is not required to pay royalties for use of these marks.

FSSO has entered into an ecclesiastical management agreement with CSI pursuant to which CSI provides FSSO with ecclesiastical advice, programs and guidance, staff training and general coordination of activities with other Scientology organizations. (A copy of the agreement is attached as Exhibit E.) In exchange for these services, FSSO supports CSI's program of activities by making ecclesiastical management payments in accordance with its means to be offset against CSI's billings.

FSSO also has entered into agreements with CSI with respect to the orthodox exhibition of films relating to the practice of the Scientology faith (Exhibit F) and the care of confidential information parishioners disclose to it in the ministration of religious services. (Exhibit G). In exchange for use of the films, FSSO provides CSI nine percent of the contributions it receives from parishioners for training.

Religious Technology Center has the authority to sublicense the right to use the confidential advanced technology of the Scientology religion outside of the United States. Pursuant to its authority Religious Technology Center has granted FSSO the right to minister the highest released levels of the advanced technology to its parishioners in accordance with strict Scriptural requirements. (Exhibit H). FSSO provides RTC six percent of value of religious services it ministers with respect to the advanced technology.

### The Church's Staff Personnel

FSSO is a "Sea Org" organization, which means its staff members belong to the Scientology religious order, the Sea Organization (or the "Sea Org"). To become members of the Sea Org, FSSO's staff members must pledge the next billion years of their existence to the Scientology religion. As Sea Org members, FSSO's staff live and work in a manner befitting their fundamental and total commitment to the Scientology faith.

They live communally in church-provided berthing and eat communally in a church-provided dining room. They are required to live on church premises, so they can live free of the distractions of the secular world and be ready to attend to their religious duties at any time during the day or night. As a general matter, each of FSSO's staff members devotes 14 hours a day to his or her ecclesiastical duties and religious study. They are required to wear the official uniforms of the Sea Org, which FSSO provides.

FSSO's staff personnel are compensated for their ecclesiastical service with a nominal allowance (currently \$50.00 a week) and small bonuses for good performance of their assigned duties, room and board, medical and dental cost (as needed) and child care or school tuition for children. They also may receive

commissions from sales of Scientology religious books at 15 percent of the sales price.

FSSO solicits contributions for its religious services through distribution of dissemination materials to Scientologists through mailings to individual Scientologists and distribution of such materials to other churches of Scientology. One of FSSO's most important dissemination materials is its magazine, Freewinds, a representative copy of which is attached as Exhibit I. FSSO does not disseminate to the general public but only to Scientologists who would qualify for FSSO's services. Other examples of FSSO's dissemination materials are attached as Exhibits J. FSSO does not have a fundraising committee and has not employed any professional fundraisers.

In addition to the above, FSSO organizes and works closely with Scientologists who do not serve on the staff of a church who either proselytize to the public or assist existing Scientologists in continuing their spiritual advancement. These Scientologists, called "Field Staff Members," play an important part in the dissemination and proselytization of the religion through word of mouth and direct contact. Since the successful efforts of Field Staff Members result in contributions of fixed donations to FSSO as well as the spiritual advancement of its parishioners, FSSO pays Field Staff Members a commission when the Scientologists with whom they have been working begin services at FSSO. FSSO staff who serve as registrars and are directly responsible for funds for FSSO, also may, under certain circumstances, also receive a very small commission (1/8 to 1/4 percent) of funds they raise.

Once the reorganization discussed in response to Part II, Question 1 is completed, FSSO also will receive payments directly from parishioners for their accommodations aboard the <u>Freewinds</u>. (Currently parishioners pay these amounts to Majestic Cruise Lines as discussed in the response to Part II, Question 5. FSSO will not undertake any special fundraising program with respect to parishioner accommodations aboard <u>Freewinds</u> apart from its current efforts, discussed above, to encourage Scientologists to participate in its religious services.

FSSO is required by Netherlands Antilles authorities to have a resident manager or director in Curacao. RMC Associates is a DBA for Roy Markes who serves as FSSO's local director. Mr. Markes is not related to any officer, director, trustee or staff member of any church of Scientology or related organization. In addition to service as FSSO's resident director, Mr. Markes also provides FSSO with invaluable assistance with respect to public relations and other matters. FSSO compensates Mr. Markes for his services not less than 36,000 Netherlands Antilles Guilder per annum (equivalent to \$20,224).

With the exception of RMC Associates, the Directors and Supervisory Directors are not compensated in these capacities. RMC Associates's compensation as a Director is reflected in the statement of FSSO's expenses in Part IV, Line 17. Henry Breuer and Sabine Bauman are staff of FSSO and are compensated for the work performed in their staff capacity. These amounts are shown in Part IV, Line 17.

### Part II, Question 5 - Relationship With Other Organizations

Because of FSSO's unique circumstances as an on-vessel church constantly sailing from port to port, several organizations have been formed to provide it necessary administrative support and to carry out additional secular functions unique to ships (<u>i.e.</u>, ship operations and passenger services). At present there are six such secular support organizations; five are wholly-owned subsidiaries of Flag Ship Trust ("FST"), a Scientology religious trust organized and operated to meet the requirements of section 501(c)(3) and which is applying for tax exemption concurrently with this application.

## Part II, Question 5 - Relationship With Other Organizations

FST was formed in 1985 for the purpose of receiving donations from Scientologists who wanted to help their religion acquire a sea-going ship from which the highest levels of Scientology religious services could be ministered to parishioners from around the world. FST also accepted donations with respect to OT VIII, which it paid to FSSO in 1988. FST accomplished its initial limited religious purposes upon acquisition and refitting of the <u>Freewinds</u>. FST currently serves as one of the repositories for the central reserves of the Scientology religion and functions as a holding company for the following secular support organizations for FSSO:

San Donato Properties, S.A., a Panamanian corporation that is the registered owner of the <u>Freewinds</u>. San Donato collects charter fees from Majestic Cruise Lines (see below) which it uses to pay the interest and principal of the <u>Freewinds</u> mortgage to Transcorp Services (see below). San Donato is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Transcorp Services. It has no staff.

Transcorp Services S.A., a Panamanian corporation which financed the purchase of the <u>Freewinds</u>. It owns all the shares of San Donato Properties and holds the mortgage on the <u>Freewinds</u>. All of its shares are owned by FST. It has no staff.

FSS Organization, a Netherlands Antilles corporation formed to facilitate FSSO's payment of certain taxes pursuant to an agreement with Netherlands Antilles tax authorities. All of its shares of stock are held by FST. It has no staff.

Majestic Cruise Lines ("Majestic"), a Panamanian corporation which actually operates the <u>Freewinds</u>, thereby allowing FSSO to limit its activities solely to the ministry of religious services. Majestic is responsible for the maintenance and operations of the <u>Freewinds</u> as well as providing accommodations, meals, and other facilities for parishioners receiving religious services at FSSO. All of the functions necessary to operate the ship both in port and at sea are conducted by Majestic. FSSO leases its space aboard the <u>Freewinds</u> from Majestic and pays Majestic for the room and board of its staff. Majestic has approximately 129 staff personnel. All of its shares of stock are owned by FST.

## Part II, Question 5 - Relationship With Other Organizations

MCL Services, N.V., a Netherlands Antilles corporation which provides shore support and liaison services for Majestic and FSSO from the <u>Freewinds</u>' home port. It has an average of five personnel. All of its shares of stock are owned by FST.

FSSO's sixth support organization, Church of Scientology Freewinds Relay Office ("CSFRO"), is a nonprofit religious corporation formed by CSI to act as a liaison between the <u>Freewinds</u> and CSI and other churches of Scientology and individuals on shore. CSFRO informs Scientologists throughout the world of FSSO's religious programs, handles communications to and from the ship and assists church staff and parishioners of FSSO in getting to and from the <u>Freewinds</u>. It has a staff of approximately nine individuals.

As discussed in response to Part II, Question 1, the activities of FSSO and several of its support organizations will be reorganized. As a result of this reorganization FSSO will undertake the activities currently being conducted by Majestic and CSFRO. Both Majestic and CSFRO subsequently will dissolve. The reorganization is to be executed as follows:

As a first step, FST, the owner of Majestic's stock, will donate the stock to FSSO. FSSO then will liquidate Majestic and take over all of its assets, liabilities, staff and responsibilities. Majestic in effect will become an unincorporated division or "org" within FSSO to provide meals and accommodations to FSSO's parishioners and staff. After liquidation, Majestic will dissolve.

FSSO will directly assume all support services that CSFRO currently is performing for FSSO and for Majestic. CSFRO's staff and assets likewise will be transferred directly to FSSO, after which it also will dissolve.

FSS Organization will be dissolved as it is no longer necessary for Netherlands Antilles tax reporting purposes.

Two of FSSO's supervisory board members also hold corporate positions with other Scientology entities. Carl Heldt and Maureen Brigatti are trustees of Flag Ship Trust, Trust for Scientologists and Scientology International Reserves Trust, and are directors of the International Association of Scientologists. Carl Heldt is also a trustee of International Publications Trust, and is a director of New Era Publications International ApS.

## Part II, Question 7 - Financial Accountability

While FSSO is responsible for and manages its own finances, it recognizes the ecclesiastical authority of CSI with respect to financial matters that affect the religion.

Consequently, FSSO presents proposals to CSI's Reserves Committee for its approval for expenditure from its reserves accounts. FSSO also provides CSI weekly reports. A representative copy of such financial reports is included in CSI's administrative record.

#### Part II, Question 9(b)

As discussed above, at present Majestic Cruise Lines operates the Freewinds for FSSO and FSSO leases its space aboard the Freewinds from Majestic pursuant to a written lease attached as Exhibit K. FSSO also has entered into a contractual agreement with the Church of Scientology Freewinds Relay Office with respect to the provision of communication and support services with respect to on-shore sources. (Exhibit L).

After the reorganization discussed in response to Part II, Questions 1 and 5 has been completed, FSSO will take over the. activities conducted by these two corporations so the lease and agreement will both be terminated. At that time, FSSO will enter into a bareboat charter with the owner of the Freewinds, San Donato Properties, S.A., on the same basis as the existing charter between Majestic and San Donato. A copy of the existing bareboat charter is attached as Exhibit M.

## Part II, Questions 11a & 11b, Determination of Charges

The amounts of contributions required for FSSO's religious services and the religious books and materials that FSSO sells, are established by the Mother Church, CSI.

CSI's policy for setting contribution rates include the following criteria: all amounts are set to enable churches of Scientology to provide the services, Scriptures and other materials of the religion to more and more members of the general public so that everyone eventually can achieve spiritual salvation. CSI accomplishes this policy by requiring all pricing proposals to undergo extensive review by the executives of the ecclesiastical hierarchy who are involved in the production, dissemination or delivery of the publication, service or material This extensive review is ecclesiastically mandated to involved. ensure each proposal meets the following three criteria.

First, the fixed donation amount must be affordable to a broad segment of the general public. Second, the amount must enable the Church to recover the costs of production or delivery Third, the donation amount must be sufficient of the materials. to enable the Church to remain operational so it can continue performing its religious functions, replenish stocks if necessary, and expand so it can provide for or minister to an ever growing congregation.

While CSI employed different methods to implement this policy over the years, the basic principles and review procedures have remained unchanged.

When FSSO takes over Majestic's activities it will continue to set charges for accommodations (which includes meals) under the same general method employed by Majestic. By this method FSSO will determine the amount necessary to cover the cost of providing the space and services in question based on 100-percent occupancy and set the charge at one-third over cost. FSSO will offer 20-percent discounts to members of the IAS and a discount of approximately 40 percent to first-time passengers.
